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## Factoring – Quick Reference

<p><b>Finding the GCF</b></p> <p>Find the GCF for: <math>30x^2 + 5x^2 - 25x</math></p> <p><b>Step 1: Look at the coefficients.</b></p> <p>Ask yourself: Is there a number that I can divide 30, 5, and 25 by evenly? Yes, 5!  <math>(30/5 = 6)</math> <math>(5/5=1)</math> <math>(-25/5 = -5)</math></p> <p><b>Step 2: Look at the variable(s).</b></p> <p>Ask yourself: Can I factor out a variable from EVERY term?      Yes! Each term has at least one x, therefore, I can factor out x.</p> <p><b>Step 3: Identify the GCF:</b></p> <p>The GCF for this polynomial is: <b>5x</b>. (You can divide every term by 5x evenly (without creating a fraction).)</p>	<p><b>Factoring by Grouping</b></p> <p>Factor the following polynomial:  <math>x^3y^2 + 2x^2 + 4x^2y^2 + 8x^2</math></p> <p><b>Step 1:</b> Separate the polynomial into 2 or more groups according to common factors. Identify the common factor for each group. (In this problem I need to rewrite the problem with common factors side by side.)</p> <p><math>x^3y^2 + 4x^2y^2</math>      <math>+ 2x^2 + 8x^2</math></p> <p><math>x^2y^2</math> is a common factor      <math>2x^2</math> is a common factor</p> <p><b>Step 2:</b> Divide each term by the common factor.  <math>\frac{x^3y^2}{x^2y^2} + \frac{4x^2y^2}{x^2y^2} + \frac{2x^2}{2x^2} + \frac{8x^2}{2x^2}</math></p> <p><math>x + 4</math>      <math>+ x + 4</math>      Result after dividing</p> <p><b>Step 3:</b> Write appropriately in factored form.  <math>x^2y^2(x+4) + 2x^2(x+4)</math></p> <p>Common Factor after dividing      Common Factor after dividing</p> <p><math>x^2y^2(x+4) + 2x^2(x+4)</math></p> <p><b>Step 4:</b> Now these two terms have a common factor. The common factor is <math>(x+4)</math>. We can factor <math>(x+4)</math> and we are left with:  <math>(x+4)(x^2y^2 + 2x^2)</math> This is the final answer in factored form.</p>						
<p><b>Factoring Using the GCF</b></p> <p>Factor the greatest common factor from:  <math>3x^3y^2 + 12x^2y - 18x^2y^2</math></p> <p><b>Solution:</b></p> <p><b>Step 1: Look at the coefficients.</b>      What is the GCF for 3, 12, 18?  <math>3x^3y^2 + 12x^2y - 18x^2y^2</math>      (What is the greatest number that can be divided into all evenly?)</p> <p><b>3 is the GCF (for the coefficients).</b></p> <p><b>Step 2: Look at the variable.</b>      Can I factor out a variable for EVERY term?      Yes! Each term contains at least one <math>x^2</math> and <math>y</math> (<math>x^2y</math>)  <math>3x^3y^2 + 12x^2y - 18x^2y^2</math>  <math>3x^2y \quad 3x^2y \quad 3x^2y</math></p> <p><math>x^2y^2 + 4x - 6y</math> (the result after dividing)</p> <p><b>Step 4: Write appropriately in factored form.</b></p> <p><math>3x^2y(x^2y^2 + 4x - 6y)</math></p> <p>OCF      Result after dividing each term by the GCF</p> <p><b>Factored Form:</b> <math>3x^2y(x^2y^2 + 4x - 6y)</math></p>							
<p><b>Factoring Trinomials</b></p> <p>Factor: <math>x^2 - 10x + 21</math></p> <p><b>Step 1:</b> We are going to form two binomials, so with two sets of parentheses.</p> <p><math>(\quad)(\quad)</math></p> <p><b>Step 2:</b> What can we multiply together to get <math>x^2</math>? (The first term of each binomial is multiplied together to get the first term of the trinomial: <math>(x \cdot x = x^2)</math>)</p> <p><math>x^2 - 10x + 21</math></p> <p><math>(\quad)(\quad)</math></p> <p><b>Step 3:</b> We need to find two numbers that we can add together to get -10 AND multiply together to get 21. (You must remember to take the sign in front of the term with it, therefore, the middle term is -10)</p> <p>Two numbers that we add to get -10 &amp; multiply to get 21      "In order to add two numbers together and get a negative number and then multiply the same two numbers and get a positive number, both numbers must be negative."</p> <table border="1" style="margin-left: auto; margin-right: auto;"> <thead> <tr> <th>Factors of 21</th> <th>Sum of Factors</th> </tr> </thead> <tbody> <tr> <td>-1 · 21 = 21</td> <td>-1 + 21 = 20</td> </tr> <tr> <td>-3 · 7 = 21</td> <td>-3 + 7 = 4</td> </tr> </tbody> </table> <p>(There are other factors, but I will stop here since I found the one I am looking for.)</p> <p>Our last terms need to be -3 and -7 since when multiplied together they equal 21 and when added together the sum is -10.</p> <p><b>Step 4: Complete the binomials.</b></p> <p><math>(x - 3)(x - 7)</math>      ← The Solution</p>		Factors of 21	Sum of Factors	-1 · 21 = 21	-1 + 21 = 20	-3 · 7 = 21	-3 + 7 = 4
